Trip Report

Turkey Creek Run 9/24/05 1973 K5 – Charlie Babcock 1996 XJ – Jim Sanford 2005 Rubicon Unlimited – Steve Smith 2005 Liberty – Rick and Diane (guests)


I hit a gas station near my house and filled up; the K5 was shaking pretty hard on the way there. I had tried some new balancing beads on the inside of the tires. It wasn't working so good. On the way to the West Side the tires warmed up and the shaking improved but was still much worse then the lead balancing weights. I arrived at the Denny's on Bell and I17 at 8am and was the first there; Steve pulled in right behind me sporting his new Warn winch. Just as I was calling Jim he pulled in with his friends Rick and Diane in the Liberty. It's got a 4" lift and 31" BFG mud terrains, very nice. These guys hit the obstacles as hard as anyone; nobody took a strap on this run.

Jim wanted to top off before we left and my truck's not one to pass a gas station without stopping so we pulled into a Chevron. It turns out you can't buy gas there unless you get a car wash. There was no place to put a credit card and a guy walks up and tells us "no wash, no gas". On the east side of I17 there was an Exxon we filled up at and then drove north. Soon I pulled off at exit 248 to Bumble Bee, approximately 4 miles down this road we pulled off west onto FR687 it was about 9:15am. We stopped to air down, stretch and what not. A ½ mile down FR687 we made sharp drop down into Black Canyon and turned right (north) up the wash. There were large pools of water here and there but no consistent running water. There was a small group of campers down the wash who stood up and strained to see the trucks as we passed.

The virtual Jeep club had run this trail the week before and left really good tracks so it was easy to find the way. The trail followed the canyon upward in the wash crossing it and through tight brush along the sides out of the main wash. Several times I consulted with Steve who had mapped what he had guessed what the trail would be on his GPS. We had no exact coordinates. Steve's calculations were right on the money. As the wide body Blazer pushed through the brush a giant walking stick (the insect) landed on my hood. I watched the 4" long creature walk along the hood and I snapped a picture. Jim played a little in one of the many sandy wash outs where water had swirled and left a pit.

The trail was a good challenge for the 2 open differentialed (Traklock) rigs in the group. Rick stopped us to trim some of the plastic molding that stuck into the wheel well on the Liberty. The 31's barely fit and he confided that he didn't think the flares would last the trip. One river crossing turned out to be a couple feet deep surprising us. There were many silt embankments we drove up that were fun.

One spot we were up high above the creek bed and came around a rock outcropping and dropped down a steep ledge. The trail was about 4' wide here which put the passenger side tires on a down hill slope and pitched the vehicles towards a 10' drop into an ominously deep looking pool. I made it around and out of the way but after seeing where my tracks were I was a little unnerved. I guided Steve through no problem, the Unlimited working beautifully. Rick asked if he could go down the streambed instead but the deep pool would have to be traversed. I spotted him through the obstacle without an incident. He did mention something about his underwear getting stuck somewhere. Jim was last and came around with his driver's side rear tire almost leaving the ground.

I found some shade along the trail so we pulled off and stopped for lunch about noon. We sat on the rock formations that made up some of the trail. Steve had his ice chest to sit on, there was a nice cool breeze blowing up the canyon. After lunch we were soon on our way again and immediately found two perfect lunch/camping spots under giant old sycamore trees shading wide gravelly sandy spots, oh well next time. The Rubicon got hung up once on the front of it's rear link but realigned and drove right up the ledge. Soon after we came to the intersection of Turkey and Poland creeks, this was our exit spot. The trail went right up the 'Y' between the creeks and up the side of the hill. The rest of the trail was rolling hills heading off towards the town of Cleator. I stopped when the town was in sight in the distance. We took a short break and enjoyed the view of the Bradshaw Mountain range on one side and the tiny town on the other.

Cruising through the town of Cleator, literally less then a dozen buildings, we waved to the few people we saw.



They seemed to be quite friendly but I couldn't tell the difference between visitors and home team. The road back to Bumble Bee is wide and graded, perfect for high speed running. As I passed a couple of ATV's I waived just before they entered the rolling cloud of dirt that was chasing me. I blinked and missed Bumble Bee and soon saw I17 in the distance. I pulled off just before the highway to air up and waited for the others. After a few minutes I called back to Steve, they had stopped just around the corner from me to air up. I must have smelled worse then I thought. I aired up grabbed a drink and drove back to the gang. Everyone said they had a great time and we talked about running the trail again in the cooler months and staying longer. We talked for a while and then I headed for home being the slowest highway cruiser, it was 2pm.
